Under her stewardship, the organization's programs address the full range of topics for girls and young women — healthy bodies/body image, literacy and financial literacy, making good life choices, building life skills, and preparing for college and careers. Thanks to Santana's efforts, Girls Inc. of OC will share \$10 million in funding from Melinda French Gates' Pivotal Ventures' Equality Can't Wait Challenge with a handful of Girls Inc. chapters nationwide, launching Project Accelerate this year.

elanie Marie Schlotterbeck has served on the Brea Planning Commission for over six years, advocating for sustainable development and natural resource protection. She led the commission through multiple contentious residential and mixed-use projects to approve or recommend approval on all projects. She also serves as a community emergency response team volunteer, which includes basic disaster response skills including fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization, and triage.

Schlotterbeck secured \$243.5 million for an innovative Environmental Mitigation Program within the Orange County Transportation Authority's (OCTA) Renewed Measure M. Two restoration projects were funded, and one acquisition (301 acres) was purchased adjacent to Chino Hills State Park through this mitigation program, advancing Hills For Everyone's mission/goals. She has been involved with the conservation of over 63,000 acres in Southern California and more than 350,0000 acres statewide.

ix years into a flourishing law career and a few months after the birth of her first child, Sona Shah decided it was time to invest her energy into something more meaningful to her. So, despite a plethora of naysayers, she left the legal profession and mustered up the courage to go back to focusing on something that had fulfilled her for decades — tutoring. With My Private Professor, she incorporated a giveback model through which part of the proceeds of each tutoring hour is used to give students in underserved communities or experiencing homelessness access to free tutoring. She also added a sliding scale for tutoring rates to make this resource accessible.

Shah's mission at MPP is to provide top-notch, individualized tutoring from a team of experts to help all students reach their greatest potential.

aria Sramek is "the O in CMR" as the founder and driving force of CMR-Carla's Movie Restaurant, the nonprofit organization that provides community-based environments for artists of all abilities to present their work to the public, and for the community to engage with and support emerging artists. She was born with a passion for films and entertainment and is also an artist, performer, and writer. As a child she was segregated in education and her family was told she would never learn to read.

CMR is now in its Ilth year as a pop-up at local restaurants for eight years, two years with online shows during the lockdown, and back in person now at the Farmers' Market with "Dog Photo Pup-Ups." CMR has hosted over 1,500 guests in person at local pop-ups and screened 100+ films.

Chris Simonsen Chief Executive Officer

hris Simonsen's background is in Ifinance and his career progressed to the point where he became the CFO of the Automobile Club of Southern California in 2005. Two years later, he made a significant career shift by becoming the CFO of Orangewood Foundation, a nonprofit in Santa Ana that serves teens and young adults who need assistance with housing, employment, education, and their physical/emotional wellness needs. In 2013, he was promoted to CEO of Orangewood Foundation which coincided with the creation of Orangewood's public charter high school, Samueli Academy. The school campus and related \$72-million capital campaign were recently completed.

As the Orangewood Foundation CEO, Simonsen has been the architect of an operating model that brings in revenue from several different sources, such as the state, county, and federal government and the private donor community.
